



The editor wishes to place on record his appreciation to various individuals and groups for the help and co-operation they extended to him in the preparation of this issue of the College Annual.

The Centenary Celebrations

The official celebrations to mark the centenary of the College began on Thursday, September 28th, 1989, when a Solemn Mass was concelebrated in the Church of Our Lady Immaculate, Refuge of Sinners, the parish church of Rathmines. Leading the very large number of priests in this celebration was His Grace, Dr. Desmond Connell, the Archbishop of Dublin, who later spoke most warmly of his personal appreciation of the educational work of the Holy Ghost Congregation in the Archdiocese.

Leading the guests of honour was His Excellency, the President of Ireland, Dr. Patrick Hillery, himself a past-student of Rockwell College. Fr. M. Maiben, senior member of the St. Mary's Community and a teacher in the College for thirty years, acted as the President's Chaplain. Fr. Cyril Byrne was chaplain to the

Minister for Education Mrs. Mary O'Rourke and the Lord Mayor of Dublin, Alderman Sean Haughey's chaplain was Fr. Daniel Curtin.

The Mass began at three o'clock in the afternoon. The Senior School Choir, specially augmented for this occasion by boys from Forms Five and Six in the Junior School, was directed by Fr. Peter Raftery, with Fr. Aloysius Flood at the organ. The gospel was read by Fr. Jerome Godfrey, Principal of the Senior School from 1977 to 1988 and the homily was preached by Fr. William Maher, a former student and prefect in the College and now, after almost thirty-five years of missionary service in Nigeria and New Guinea, once again a member of the Community.

During the Offertory procession, various gifts, symbolic of the history and life of the College, were brought to the altar. These





included one of the first Academic Medals to be awarded soon after the opening of the school, the specially made silver casket which was used to bring the petition, requesting the re-opening of the school, to the General Chapter of the Congregation in Paris in 1926, the Coat of Arms of the College, a globe to illustrate the far-flung missionary endeavour of successive past students, a football and a violin, emphasising the sporting and musical aspects of College life. The gifts of bread and wine were presented by Mr. and Mrs. J. Barry, parents of Shane, Paul, Cormac and Colm.

Joining the Archbishop at the altar was His Grace, Archbishop Thomas Brosnahan, C.S.Sp., now living in retirement at Kimmage Manor, after over fifty years missionary labour in Nigeria and Sierra Leone. Dr. Brosnahan was a close friend and colleague of Fr. Edmund Burke who died on the morning of his Golden Jubilee in 1983 after many years service to St. Mary's. Also at the altar were two former presidents of the College, Fr. James Hurley and Fr. William Nugent as well as the current President, Fr. Hugh O'Reilly. With them were the Provincial, Fr. Brian McLaughlin, a paststudent, and the Parish priest of Rathmines, Fr. Aidan Burke, a past-student of Blackrock, to whom we own a deep debt of thanks for permitting us to have this Solemn Mass in the Parish Church.

The Past Students were led by the President of their Union, Mr. Frank Dowling and his wife, Terry. The Centenary Committee was represented by their chairman, Professor Michael MacCormac. The lay teachers of the College, who had put in a great deal of hard work to ensure that everything went according to plan, were present in large numbers with the Princi-

After the Mass, all the guests made their way back to the College and took their places in in the playground where a special dais had been erected. The Archbishop and the Minister took their places on the dais, accompanied by Fr. Hugh O'Reilly, Fr. Sean O'Shaughnessy, Principal Junior School, the Provincial Fr. Brian McLaughlin, Principal of the Senior School, Mr. Frank Conlon, the Vice-Principal, Pól Uasal Mac Murchú, Mr. Frank Dowling, President of the PPU, the Chairman of the Centenary Committee, Professor Michael MacCormac and the architect of the new extension, Mr. Hugo Duffy. Prior to blessing the new building, the Archbishop addressed the assembled guests as follows:

Before I pronounce the blessing, I would like now again very briefly to refer to the importance of this day. Everything before me speaks of the future. We have just given thanks for the past in our Mass and now I see the future in the building that I am just about to bless because it speaks to me of the expansion of this school.

The young faces that I see around me speak to me of the future. How important is our future? These young people bear that future in their hands and it is our responsibility to enable them to advance to

I want to express my deep appreciation in the presence of Father Provincial to the Holy Ghost Fathers for the great work that they are doing on behalf of the Diocese in so many different ways.

Only very recently, another parish has been undertaken by the Holy Ghost Fathers. There is a great diversity of work in which the Holy Ghost Fathers are assisting me, but I value the work that they are doing in the schools more than any work that they are doing on my behalf. And I value the work that is done by the individual Holy Ghost Father in the classroom. Because it is there that the young people will learn for the future not just simply the secular subjects that they are being taught but they will learn something of the spirit of the Church which is given to them in the catholic education that you offer so wonderfully here.

As I pronounce the blessing upon this new building, I have confidence in the future. I look forward to what this school will contribute to the work and to the growth of the catholic life of this diocese in the future. I look forward with great confidence because I am calling upon this school the blessing of the Holy Spirit and I am calling upon Him

through the intercession of Mary who was

filled with the Holy Spirit.

All praise to God our Father, Lord of all creation. He has called us to share in the work of educating our children. With His help, we try to prepare them for life. We give them a share in the wisdom and skills of those who have gone before us. We help them to see the world and their lives through the eyes of God. We want them to have the mind of Christ who is the wisdom and knowledge of God made Man.

Bless this extension which we place under the patronage of Mary our Mother.

Bless the teachers and parents and all who work here.

Bless the students who will study here.

May the peace and happiness of Christ accompany their efforts to be good citizens of our country and heirs to the Kingdom of Heaven.

May this school always be a home of truth, of wisdom, of faith and of good will towards all.

May all of us who are united in prayer for the good of this school be reunited in the glory of your Kingdom.

We ask this through Christ our Lord.

Amen.

When he finished his address, the Archbishop blessed the building and the Minister for Education, Mrs. Mary O'Rourke, TD, declared it officially open. She unveiled a memorial plaque on the exterior wall and then gave an eloquent and informal speech. To mark the occasion, presentations were made to the Archbishop and the Minister by the Captain and Vice-Captain of the School, Colman McMahon and Shane Lowry.

The guests were then invited to inspect the new building and to partake of light refreshments in the Concert Hall.

Homily preached by Fr. William Maher, C.S.Sp. at the Centenary Mass, September 28th, 1989.

"My soul magnifies the Lord And my spirit rejoices in God my Saviour."

The words of the Magnificat which you have just heard, and which St. Luke places on the lips of the Virgin Mary when she went to visit her cousin Elizabeth, is a cry of wonderment, that the God of all creation should stoop so low as to have anything to do with so lowly a person. It is followed by a cry of gratitude that he should do so in so wonderful a manner as to choose a creature to be the Mother of His Son. As such, it is a hymn which sums up what our sentiments should be as we begin the celebration of the 100th year of the existence of St. Mary's College. In fact we might take the Magnificat as the anthem for this celebratory year, expressing as it does our gratitude to Almighty God for all the good things He has done for us through St. Mary's.

When it came to choosing the Mass with which to celebrate this event, there were three obvious possibilities available to us. But before I begin to speak of them, perhaps I should make quite clear what that event is which we are celebrating here at this moment. Ninetynine years ago this month, St. Mary's College

officially began its existence as a private catholic secondary school. The date was the 8th September, 1890, the Feast of the Birthday of the Blessed Virgin Mary. We would have liked to hold this ceremony on that same date this year, but there was too little time from the re-opening

of school after the summer holidays to organise everything. For instance, even such an accomplished choir as we have in the school, needs some little time to prepare. You have already enjoyed some of the fruits of that preparation. There is more to come.

This month is, therefore, the beginning of the 100th year since that foundation date, and the Centenary Committee intend to stage events throughout this 100th year of the existence of St. Mary's College, which will see its culmination on the 8th September 1990, next year.


So, it is fitting that we should begin this year of celebration with Mass in the religious centre of the parish in which the school was founded. I mentioned three possibilities in the choice of Mass for this occasion. The first to spring to the mind of a Holy Ghost Father was the Votive Mass of the Holy Spirit, the Giver of all good gifts and the source of all the graces that have come to the students, staff, parents and fami-


lies through the existence of the College. The second possibility was a Mass of Our Lady, to whom the College owes, not merely its name, but that maternal protection to which it was confided from its very beginnings. The third choice, and the one finally decided upon, was simply the Mass of Thanksgiving, into which we can pool all the feelings of gratitude that move us on this occasion; gratitude to God, in Three Divine Persons, for everything; to our Blessed Mother for her maternal solicitude; to everyone connected with the school from its conception to the present day. In fact, we would do well to devote the entire centenary year to thanksgiving for all the favours received through the school, the education it provided, and the milieu it offered for human development.

With all due respects to Henry Ford, who considered all history bunk, it may surprise many what lessons history can hold for us, if only we had the wisdom to see what we are

looking at. The old Spanish saying, crystalised for us by Paul Claudel as, "God writes straight with crooked lines", holds true in every page of history, recent or ancient. It is a fact that should be familiar to all Christians from their reading of the history of the Jewish people as revealed to us in the Bible, and of the history of the early Christians as revealed to us in the New Testament, but the pity is that few Christians ever relate what they read in their Bibles to the history being made and lived around them. That God's hand is at work in all the events of life is as incontestable as the sun in the sky. That He writes straight although the lines appear to us to be crooked is evident to all but the invincibly blind.

From the reading that I have been doing recently of the history of the Holy Ghost Fathers, it has been gradually borne in on me that almost nothing that was intended by way of a major undertaking actually turned out as initially intended. Poullart de Places, the Founder of the Holy Ghost Fathers in 1703, intended to establish a seminary in Paris, where young aspirants to the priesthood, who were too poor to go to any of the established seminaries, could receive their priestly education free. The religious society he founded to run that seminary ended up as the fountain of a stream of vocations that spread the faith to the French colonies all over the world. Francis Libermann, in 1841, intended to found a Society to look after the spiritual welfare of liberated black slaves. That Society ended up by amalgamating with the Congregation of Poullart de Places in 1848 and becoming one of the great modern missionary societies of the church and spread throughout the five continents.

The history of the Holy Ghost Fathers in Ireland was no different. The pioneering band, led by Fr. Jules Léman, landed in Dun Laoghaire on October 28, 1859, with the firm intention of starting a seminary like that of All Hallows, Drumcondra, which would take in young men who had finished their secondary schooling and prepare them for ordination as Holy Ghost Fathers, thus ensuring a plentiful supply of missionaries to the English-speaking colonies of Africa. What they ended up with was Blackrock College.

Then came Rockwell College. This was started as a nursery for the Church in Scotland. A Frenchman, who had been commercially successful in Scotland, donated the Rockwell property to the Holy Ghost Fathers, on condition that they train 12 students every year for the Scottish Mission. Within a very short time difficulties arose over the carrying out of the provisions of the gift, entailing a long legal battle which ended with the judgment given in favour of the Holy Ghost Fathers and Rockwell became, like Blackrock, a secondary school with a junior scholasticate for young aspiring Holy Ghost Fathers.

It was no different with St. Mary's College. The original intention - to start a private catholic secondary day-school endured, but the original reasons given for starting it, on the part of the Holy Ghost Fathers, changed radically in a fairly short time and, in fact, contributed greatly to the closure of the school after only 26 years of existence. Archbishop Walsh of Dublin, and Canon Fricker of Rathmines wanted the school for the obvious reason that it was needed by the catholic families of the area. At the time, there was no catholic secondary day-school for boys south of the Grand Canal, the great dividing line between the city and suburbs. The nearest schools were the Christian Brothers School, Synge St., and the Marist Fathers' Catholic University School, Leeson St. The Intermediate system had come into force in

1878, but it was not until 1894 that Synge St. had a full secondary school to senior grade. CUS was physically constricted as to its potential for growth and could not be expected to cope with the numbers from the growing suburbs. For five or six years a Diocesan secondary day-school had operated in 83 St. Stephen's Green, South, in one of the houses belonging to the Catholic University of Cardinal Newman. This was in response to the challenge of the new Intermediate system. It was called St. Gall's Catholic University Secondary School. But its closure in 1887 only highlighted the need, to which St. Mary's was seen as the answer.

The Holy Ghost Fathers agreed wholeheartly with these reasons for making the foundation, but added a few of their own. Past students. and even ex-Prefects, of Blackrock College had made up a large part of the teaching staff of St. Gall's on the Green. Its failure created a feeling of vicarious responsibility in the authorities of Blackrock, which was assuaged by the foundation of another catholic day-school, St. Mary's, not too far away. Not that there wasn't a trace of self-interest also in their altruism. The area between the city and Blackrock was filling in rapidly with housing and families, and it was felt that Blackrock might be at risk if some other Religious Order started a school in the area. A Holy Ghost day-school here would protect Blackrock's flanks.

Another reason for founding a day-school in Dublin was the firmly but erroneously held idea that day-schools, without the overheads associated with Boarders, were economic goldmines. Such a day-school was seen to be the answer to the chronic drain on financial resources that the juniorates in particular represented, in Blackrock and Rockwell. The young students admitted to the juniorates were not always in a position to pay the full boarding fee, but as prospective members of the Congregation they were admitted at reduced fees. It was felt that a profitable day-school could ease this burden on the finances of the Congregation. How wrong they were!

To buy the property across the road from us here, which became St. Mary's College, money had to be borrowed. To adapt the house so that it could be used as a school, money had to be borrowed. There was no room for the Community in the original house, so a house

had to be rented for the first year, 13 Leinster Square, to accommodate them. Further outlay! At the end of the first year, during which all the inadequacies of the building had revealed themselves, major building and extension had to be undertaken. More money had to be borrowed. The Superior General could not provide all the staff necessary, because of all the calls on men by the Missions, so lay professors had to be engaged. Further outlay. The front field had to be levelled and cleared of trees to make a football field. More borrowing. In spite of the chaplaincies, Masses and Confessions undertaken by the Fathers in neighbouring parishes and convents, on top of their already quite onerous teaching and other duties, in order to bring in the much-needed finance, the debt continued to grow and became a salient factor in the decision to close the school in 1916.

Once again we see with what crooked lines Providence writes the history of human endeavours. St. Mary's was destined to be a catholic day-school, whose raison d'etre was contained in its own definition. The ulterior intentions of those who fathered the project were set at nought (although they were neither wrong nor unreasonable). Nor did even a ten-year hiccup, during which the school was closed as a secondary school, do more than interrupt

momentarily the onward march of what is evidently God's work. For ten years the school became the House of Philosophy for the Holy Ghost scholastics who were prevented by World War I from going to France as usual for their studies. From the re-opening of the school in September 1926 to the present day, the school has gone from strength to strength, in what can only truly be considered a providential way.

It is a common fault of those who have reached middle age to have fears for the future. These fears are not so much for themselves as for the work they are engaged in, or the society in which they live, or their country, or the world at large. Fears based largely on the challenges they themselves have had to cope with during life; challenges which arise to a great extent from social changes, bringing inevitable changes in outlook on matters great and small. How often do we hear people say that they would hate to be growing up now. Ouite so. It would not be easy to be growing up today with the mentality of someone brought up a generation ago. But that is not the mentality of those growing up now. They were born into this age, so this age holds no fears for them. They have the confidence of youth. And that is how it should be.

Twenty-five years ago, Dr. Peter Birch, Bishop of Ossory, spoke on the occasion of the centenary of Rockwell College. He said that the pioneers who undertook so bravely the foundation and development of the school, did not fear the future. They had confidence in the future because they understood that the future was contained in the present, as in a seed. We know this is true. That is why we use the phrase: 'you reap what you sow'. What you reap was already


present, at the time of the sowing, in the seed that you sowed. The Founding Fathers of St. Mary's and their successors down through the years had supreme confidence in the message they had to communicate, in the educational philosophy they had to impart, knowing it was based on the Good News brought by Him who give the increase to what they sowed and watered. They knew the future was looked after by applying the perennial values of the Gospel to the needs of the day. With confidence in God and in the protection of His and our Blessed Mother, the future held no fears for them. And the history of the past 100 years has proved them right.

In one sense, it is true that all education must be concerned with the future, since it is a training for future living. But you prepare for the future, not by dwelling on it and seeking to forestall all its challenges and pitfalls, but by developing the ability to tackle the problems of the present, as a preparation for tackling those of the future. Consequently, in education, only those should fear the future who lack confidence in the matter or methods of what they are doing today. It is no compliment to the next generation nor to our own work as educators, to want to protect them from every challenge and effort in the future. If we endeavour to provide them with the proper values and attitudes in facing the challenges of today, we can have confidence in their ability to face the challenges of tomorrow.

Generations of boys who have passed through St. Mary's over the past 100 years are the most eloquent proof of the confidence in the future that successive Presidents and Staffs of the College have had in that philosophy of education.



So, while we look back with pride and gratitude on the past 100 years, we can see how straight God was writing with all those crooked and broken lines that make up the history of St. Mary's and we can look forward with hope to whatever the future may hold, knowing that, if we keep faith with the spirit with which our predecessors were imbued, it will continue to be God's work and continue to rest in the hollow of his hand.

I should like to conclude with the very prayer with which the first President of St. Mary's College, Fr. Tom Fogarty, ended his first report to the Mother House in Paris:

"As can be seen, it is not in vain that we have placed our confidence in Mary, to whose patronage our work has been confided. May we continue to merit always her maternal protection."

The Banquet

The next major event in the centenary calendar was a Banquet in Dublin's Burlington Hotel. It is interesting to note that the hotel was built on the site of Tullamaine, which was a House of Residence for Wesley College when the College occupied premises in St. Stephen's Green. There have been sporting connections between the two schools from an early date. The Banquet was a most enjoyable event and its success was due in great part to the painstaking planning and preparation of the Centenary Committee, especially Dr. and Mrs. B. Deasy. Many different generations of former students and their partners gathered in the hotel on the evening of Friday, February 23rd, 1990 and renewed acquaintanceships and friendships among themselves and with members of the Community and Teaching Staff, past and present. The Guest of Honour was the recently appointed Apostolic Nuncio to Ireland, His Grace, Archbishop Emmanuel Gerada, DD. The toast of Uachtarán na hÉireann was proposed by the President of the College Union, Mr. Frank Dowling. The toast of His Holiness, Pope John Paul II was proposed by the Provincial Superior, Fr. Brian McLaughlin with the Apostolic Nuncio replying. The toast of the College was proposed by Professor Michael MacCormac of the Centenary Committee to which the President of the College, Fr. Hugh O'Reilly, replied.

Mass in the College

On Saturday, September 8th, 1990, a Solemn Mass was concelebrated in the College Chapel. This was an occasion on which the Community and Staff of the College played host to the members of the Holy Ghost Congregation from other communities and works within the Irish Province. September 8th was chosen for this occasion for two reasons. First, it marked the actual one hundredth birthday of the College and secondly, it was the anniversary of the first religious profession of the majority of the members of the Province. Liturgically, the day marked the birthday of Our Lady and thus a fitting and eloquent link was forged between the Mother of God and the College which bears her name. The Concelebrants were led by Fr. Brian McLaughlin, the Provincial, who spoke as follows in the course of his homily:

Today we celebrate two extremely important birthdays – Our Lady's and the birth day of St. Mary's College and Community because it was on this day, September 8th, 1890, that the first thirty-four boys registered here in St. Mary's. I think a birthday is principally





a time for giving thanks - thanks for being born and thanks for another year of life. Our principal feeling today must be one of thankfulness - thankfulness that St. Mary's was born and came into being a hundred years ago and thankfulness that it now begins another year of life.

We are also thankful for all who have contributed over the last hundred years to St. Mary's - the staff, religious and lay, the pupils, past and present. All have contributed to give St. Mary's a very special spirit. I could elaborate a great deal on this particular spirit but I am afraid I might be accused of being biased!

Today is also the birthday of Our Lady and our school is called St. Mary's in her honour. Our Gospel today underlines the function of Mary in making God present here on earth. "The Virgin will conceive and give birth to a Son and they will call him Emmanuel' a name which means 'God is with us'." And the basic role and goal of a Catholic school must be this - to make God present more in our society by forming pupils who as young men will, in their lives, through their example, make God present. And today that is a very difficult and a very challenging task. And St. Mary's boys have not flinched from this. having before them their motto, 'Fidelitas in Arduis' - 'faithfulness in difficult things'. And so it is with confidence that the school can face this challenge because it knowns that in the past, in the present and in the future, it has produced and will continue to produce young men who are conscious of the values of charity, of justice, of authenticity and of fairness - values which our society badly needs today, values which, if practiced, will make God more present in our world.

Gala Concert

The centenary celebrations came to a fitting close on the evening of Sunday, September 23rd 1990, when a Gala Celebration Concert was presented in the National Concert Hall in Earlsfort Terrace. 





named 'Muck Truck'. Since the camp was situated beside a lake, opportunities abounded for swimming, sailing, fishing, windsurfing and boating. After a most enjoyable few days, the time came to say farewell. One or two tears were shed in the school yard in Eau Claire on the Sunday morning. We headed for Minneapolis Airport for our journey back to Ireland, which we reached 24 hours later, 'tired but happy' (!)

We would also like to thank two very important people, Dermot Rafter (Troop Leader) and Martin Breen (Camp Director). Without their dedicated hard work, the trip would not have taken place. 




Wednesday, October 25th



Today's Senior Cup Match against Wesley, scheduled for Lakelands, had to be postponed due to bad weather.





Hon. Secretary's Report 1989/90

The 63rd year of the Past Pupils' Union (CSSp) 1989/1990 was as usual a busy and eventful year especially with the school celebrating its Centenary.

A special 'Centenary Co-Ordinating Committee' was set up for the occasion. Although the committee consisted mostly of past pupils, it was not as such a 'Past Pupils' Union' Committee.

The Union committee itself had little if any input into the various Centenary Events bar the Past Pupils' Union Centenary Dinner – November 17th, 1989; the President's Centenary Golf-Outing, Milltown – 10th May 1990 and The Centenary Junior Function – March 26th, which were all organised by the Union Committee.

The College held a con-celebrated Holy Mass to mark its Centenary year and kindly invited our President Frank Dowling and the Union Committee. It was a marvellous occasion and a privilege to have attended. The President on behalf of the Union presented a 5' x 5' handwoven tapestry of the Centenary Crest to Fr. O'Reilly and the Community on 28th September to commemorate the College Centenary.

The Centenary co-ordinating committee also

set up a 'Centenary Fund' to raise money to equip a laboratory in the school's new extension. This equipment cost the school £35,000-£40,000. The Union contributed £5,000 directly from its own funds, which was presented to Fr. O'Reilly at the Centenary Banquet in February. The President then wrote to past-pupils asking for their contribution. To date approximately £3,850 was received but the fund is still open for further contributions.

Calendar of Union Events

1. The Family Mass for deceased past pupils and teachers was held in the College on Sunday 7th November. Regrettably the attendance was very bad. This could be attributed to the fact the the 'Reminder Card' normally posted mid-October, was not circularised. The Union Committee intend to to so this year. The Union will also search its records for a more comprehensive list of deceased members.

The Union was sad to lose two devoted men to St. Mary's, John Fanagan and Terence Coveney recently deceased. John was a past President of the Union in 1971 and we offer their families and in particular John Fanagan's son David, who was Hon. Secretary of the Union for many years, our sympathy and condolences. We also offer our condolences to Kevin Lewis whose father also died during the year.

2. The College and the Union joined together to celebrate the *College Centenary Annual Dinner* on November 17th. Before the event there were discussions about holding the dinner outside the school but happily 290 Union members, some of the College Community and their guests attended the dinner in the concert hall. It was a tight squeeze but the evening was very enjoyable and successful.

3. On the 10th January over 100 past pupils, several teachers and priests attended the *Ten Year-Out* (Junior function) in the College hall. This is usually attended by the very recent school leavers who left over the prior 2-3 years.

Later in the year – March 26th a new Junior Centenary Function was held in the Harcourt Hotel. It was organised by John Whelan and Michael McLoughlin (1989 school leavers). They deserve special mention as they came up with the idea and followed it through. It was a tremendous success with over 180 attending and managed to make a modest profit.

It is hoped that this function would be joined up with the 'Ten Year-Out' function and become a permanent part of the union calendar.

- 4. The Lorcan Gogan Memorial Debate was held on 9th March and the motion 'Real Life begins when you leave school' was proposed by the school. Irwin Mill-Arden chaired the debate with Ronan Walsh, Niall Tracey, Dermot Rafter and Dara Kilmartin in opposition representing the past pupils team. The debate was badly attended by both union members and pupils. There is obviously a need to revitalize an interest in the debate which has been the subject of much discussion within the Committee. The low profile of the debate concerns the Union Committee and the situation is currently being discussed with the school.
- 5. The Joint-Unions (CSSp) Golf Outing in the Castle Golf Club was held on March 27th. Once again it proved to be very popular and competitive. This is contested among the CSSp Colleges but the St. Mary's boys were once again unsuccessful. The Kimmage Cup was won by the Templeogue team. £600 the proceeds from the outing was presented to the Provincial, Fr. Brian McLaughlin.
- 6. Good Friday 13th April the *Day of Reconciliation* consisted of a retreat from Fr. Ronan Grimshaw: 9.30 a.m.-3.00 p.m. followed by the normal Good Friday ceremonies.
- 7. On May 10th *The President's Cup* was competed for in the PPU Annual Golf Outing in Milltown. It is only a coincidence that next

year's President Dan Coveney won the Cup and his brother Brian was runner up. The competition was tough with over 100 players competing but regrettably only 69 attended the meal and prizegiving afterwards.

It is proposed for future years that prize winners will only be picked from those attending the dinner. However, the outing in the end proved to be a financial success and a great day thanks to the organising committee. John Pardy of AIB Finance & Leasing, Rathmines, generously sponsored the prizes.

- 8. The Annual Supper Dance was held in the Grange Golf Club, 11th May, only 97 people attended. This function has been slipping in popularity over the last couple of years. A contributing factor could be that this function is held very close to the Golf Outings, the President's Cup and the Joint Unions Outing. Financially the outing was a success but only because the draw contributed substantially.
- 9. The Union's Sports Day was held on Sunday 10th June back at its old venue Kenilworth Square. However, Kenilworth was not in the condition past pupils would be accustomed too. This did not deter the very large numbers which attended especially for the soccer seven-a-side. Over 15 teams competed in the soccer representing approximately the last 15 years of school leavers, although there were several players

who left St. Mary's well before 1975 and in fact one or two before 1970, which was quite an achievement for the organising committee. The cricket kept the 'more mature' senior members happy as did the inflatable castle for the children.

Because of the renewed interest and success of the sports-day, next year's organising committee will stay with Kenilworth and hope to introduce other amusements and amenities.

The main activities of the union are the various functions and events just mentioned but the Union also undertakes various other activities and projects.

1990 Diary

The Union produced another Diary. However, they were late in reaching the members. This delay was caused by continuous problems with the printer, who has since been replaced by a St. Mary's man, Paddy Funge of Elo Press. The 1990 diary highlighted several problems but also contained many more past pupils names and addresses from previous years. We expect to have them distributed before Christmas.

The Diary up to now has been financed by the various adverts contained in it and hopefully the 1991 will receive as much support.

Last year I reported that a Joint Conference of St. V. de Paul between the College and the Union was being considered. However,

Fr. O'Reilly later suggested that the Union go it alone. In the meantime Barney Moran is investigating the various activities it could pursue. Fr. The Directors were delighted that the Dublin Youth Theatre Group are purchasing the club. premises to continue their good work for the young people of Dublin.





St. Mary's Scout Report










through to send Eoin Ormond over again for his second try, making the final score 8-7 in favour of St. Mary's.




Under Thirteens
